On Sunday Lance-Corporal William Tangney arrived at Morven. He left New Zealand with the 5th Reinforcements, and after being invalided from Gallipoli went through the campaigns in France, where he was wounded in December last. His wounds are of a serious nature. Early in the war Lance-Corporal Tanguey lost his brother in the Braemar Castle disaster. Tom Taugney was in the Dublin Fusiliers, and saw active service during the Boer war. He was in New Zealand during 1911. Another brother, John Tangney (N.Z.R.) was killed in action at Gallipoli. Three other brothers, Privates Robert, Frank, and Walter Tangney, have been wounded on active service, but have rejoined the Colours "somewhere in France." Another brother, Privato P. Tangney, is also in khaki. To have seven members of one family in khaki is a mat-ter of which not only Morven, but South Canterbury should be proud. These young men are brothers of Mr Joe Tangney, who is well known in business circles in Morven. Mr Joe Tangney, who was drawn in the last ballot, has been medically examined. passed as Class A, and ordered into camp in August.
