MAGISTRATE'S COURT.

TIMARU, OCTOBER 8.

Louis Brosnahan was charged that on October 6, 1930, at Timaru, being a person against whom a prohibition order had been issued, did during the currency of such order, procure liquor from some person or persons unknown. Defendant pleaded guilty. Senior-Sergeant I. Mathieson said that defendant's drunken behaviour had resulted in the police being called to his house. On arrival they found the man's wife and children locked out, and there were glasses and a "square-rigger" in the house. Defendant was prohibited on December 5, 1929, and for some time afterwards had kept the terms of his order. The "square rigger" and drinking glass (produced), were found on the floor. Defendant stated that when he arrived home there had been a disagreement. The bottle of liquor which had been in his pocket had been pulled out and upset. He had not consumed any of the liquor. The Magistrate: "You know what a breach of this order means? You can be sent to Roto Roa Island." A fine of £4, in default 14 days' imprisonment was imposed, a fortnight being allowed to find the money.
