20th March 1918

My Dear Sister

Now Alice<sup>2</sup> you will have to excuse me for being so long answering your letter but you will know the cause by this time.<sup>3</sup>

I tried to write a few lines to Florrie<sup>4</sup> as soon as I could get going.

Well Alice, my hand is just about right, though I am to go under some special treatment at another New Zealand hospital.<sup>5</sup> I am pleased to say that I will not be disfigured very much. I hope this note finds you and Father<sup>6</sup> in the very best of health. I think I sent Father the photo of Aunt Tilly<sup>7</sup> to have a look at. I will not go down that way when I get my furlough, I might go down to Father's Brother's<sup>8</sup> place when I go down to Hornchurch which is very near there. Well, Florrie tells me that Edie<sup>9</sup> has been down to Timaru for the holidays, I hope she and the children had an enjoyable time.

I suppose you are still living in the same place and getting quite used to the place. My word, Tom<sup>10</sup> will be pleased that his boy<sup>11</sup> is coming home, he will have about arrived home by this time. Remember me to Tom when you see him.

I might say that I am pleased you find time to go up to see Florrie, but I suppose she often comes down to see you. I think I told Florrie the beauty of this place, I can assure you I don't like leaving one place after getting used to it.

I will now close these few lines hoping they find you all well and the best of spirits.





### MRS MARY ANN CULLEN OBITUARY 26.07,1912

Tue late Mrs Cullen, wife of Mr George Cullen, who died in Timaru a few days age, was one of the pioneers of this country who served her day and generation well. ### OBITUARY.

MR W. B. CULLEN.

The funeral of the late Mr W. B. Cullen took place in Timaru yesterday afternoon, and the large number of friends who attended it hore testimony to the esteem in which he was held. It was a military funeral, the deceased having served his country in two wars—the South African War and the Great War. The funeral procession, which left the deceased's home in North Street shortly before two o'clock. North Street shortly before two o'clock, North Street shortly before two o'clock, was headed by a firing party from the Territorials, under Sergeant-Major Patchett, followed by the Band of the Second South Canterbury Regiment, led by Drum-Major Stovenson. The coffin, draped with the Union Jack, was borne on the gun carriage, and following were South African Ex-Contingenters, members of the R.S.A., the Timaru Volunteer Fire Brigade (of which the deceased had been a member for many years), the Timaru Railwhich the deceased had been a mem-ber for many years), the Timaru Rail-way Fire Brigade, Bt. John Ambul-ance, members of the Druids Lodge, members of the Star Football Club, and members of the Star Football Club, and the general public. Four Ex-Contingenters acted as pall-bearers. The service at the graveside was conducted by the Rev. G. V. Gerard, and following the church service there was a short one conducted by Arch Druid D. In civil life he was employed by the N.M. and A. Co. When men were wanted for the South African War he was among the first to offer his services, and when the Great War came along he was again among the early ones to offer for service getting away with the 5th Rein. among the early ones to offer for service, getting away with the 5th Reinforcoment. He was a valued member of the Timaru Fire Brigade, and assisted materially in helping to hold up its reputation as the most efficient Brigade of its kind in the Dominion. In his younger days he was a keen footballer and played for the Star Football Club. Of a modest and retiring disposition his guiding principle in life was to do what he believed to be right and to do it well, and in this he succeeded beyond the ordinary.
