COMPLIMENTARY DINNER AT FAIRLIE CREEK. — Mr Charles Wederell having sold his interest in the Fairlie Creek Hotel, a few of his friends entertained him at a farewell dinner on Tuesday night last, on the eve of his departure from Fairlie Creek, where he has resided for the last seven years. Although the notice given was very short, sixteen of Mr Wederell's friends sat down to a splendid dinner, served by the new landlord, Mr Thos. Winter, in a style which reflects the greatest credit on the cuisine of his establishment. Mr Jas. Milne acted as Chairman, and Mr H. Struthers as croupier.
