Mr and Mrs Burden, of Parkhurst, states the Geraldine correspondent of the "Lyttelton Times," have received advice by cable that their second son at the front, Lieutenant Randal Burdon, of the Queen's Royal West Surrey Regiment, received a gunshot wound in the right shoulder. He is now in hospital at Reading and is getting on well. Their relative, Lieutenant James Robert Dennistoun, son of Mr G. J. Dennistoun, of Peel Forest, who was reported wounded and missing, is in a German hospital at Douai. A Bavarian nurse has written to Lieutenant Dennistoun's mother informing her that he received three shots in the stomach and underwent very critical operations but it was hoped he would pull through. His cousin, Sir Herbert Russell, formerly of Hawke's Bay, who was with Lieutenant Dennistoun when he was wounded, was shot through the lung and badly burnt but he was getting on well. The German aviator who brought them down had called on the wounded airmen.

GERALDINE NATIONAL PARTY

BRANCH FORMED

A well attended meeting of supporters unanimously decided to form a Geraldine branch of the National Party at a gathering which was addressed by Mr S. G. Holland, M.P., at the Presbyterian Hall on Thursday. The Mayor (Mr B. R. Macdonald) presided, and associated with him was Mr T. D. Burnett, M.P. There were about 60 present.

In welcoming Mr Holland, the Mayor expressed regret that the meeting had clashed with a function in aid of the School, but Mr Holland was leaving for Rarotonga on Monday evening, and that night was the only one on which he was available to speak at Geraldine.

Mr Holland traversed the work of the session and the Government's programme, and urged all anti-Labour opinion to pull together so that they could put up as good a fight as possible at the next election.

On the motion of Commander G. H. Dennistoun and Captain R. M. Burdon the meeting unanimously decided to form a branch of the National Party in Geraldine, and the following committee was appointed:—Messrs J. M. Polhill, K. Mackenzie, A. Mackenzie, D.
