### **PRIVATE HARDING.**

Private Charles Augustus Harding, who died at Trentham on Monday, was the youngest son of the late Mr and Mrs Harding, of Dunedin. He was early apprenticed to the Dunedin horse trainer H. Goodman, in whose service he was for many years. Afterwards he rode in Australia and in Canterbury. He was 53 years of age, and enlisted in Christchurch with the Eighteenth Reinforcements. His brother, Mr W. H. Harding, of Charles road, on Saturday last received a letter from him stating that all was well. On Sunday he received a telegram that his brother was ill, and on Monday another that he was dead. The deceased had only lately come from Australia. He was married, and his wife is in New South Wales. A military funeral will be accorded the remains in Christchurch tomorrow, the body having been brought down from Wellington on Tuesday night.
