Cabled news comes of the death from wounds, of Rifleman Wm. Mangos, a member of the well-known Lyell family. Deceased who was some 32 years of age was engaged in contracting before he enlisted. He leaves a widow and one child just recently born.

Colonist. 13 September 1917 (Papers Past) [20/06/2016]

Rifleman William Mangos, of Lyell, who has died of wounds, leaves a widow and an infant child. At the time of his enlistment Rifleman Mangos was a contractor in the Lyell district. He was a native of Lyell, and aged 32 years.
