November 7, 1914

November 9, 1914

Ten youngsters of Orari, imbued with a desire to help the poor Belgian children, kept Guy Fawkes Day in style; dressed as wounded soldiers, nurses and poor refugees, they paraded the district with the "Old Kaiser" in a barrow and were successful in collecting one pound, six shillings and fourpence for the Relief Fund.

Needless to say they finished the day burning the "Old Kaiser" in

McClelland, son of Thomas William McClelland of Winchester joined up with the 3rd Reinforcements of the Canterbury Infantry Battalion and embarked from Wellington on 14 February 1915. He was mentioned in despatches London Gazette, 4 January 1917, p261, Rec No132: "Action: Goose Alley, drop Alley, Flers Trench, West of Flers, 20th/ 21st September 1916. When the 2nd Canterbury Battalion was heavily counter attacked during the afternoon of the 21st September this non-commissioned officer stuck to his post under great pressure, and endeavoured to rescue a wounded man under heavy bomb fire." Sergeant McClelland was killed in action at Bapaume, France on 14

August 1918 and buried at Queens Cemetery, Bucquoy, Pas-de-Calais,

November 12, 1914
On Tuesday evening, the land agents of Timaru met at the office of Messrs Howden and Innes-Jones to bid goodbye to Mr Ben. Sparrow, who has volunteered for the front. Mr R. N. Hawkes, who presided, spoke of the energy and uprightness that had characterised Mr Sparrow's career during the seven years he had carried on business as a land agent in Timaru, and wished him all success and a safe return. W. Angland, in a few well-chosen

remarks, then presented Mr Sparrow with a gold-mounted

fountain pen.
Driver Benjamin Sparrow
joined the 2nd Reinforcements of the
Army Service Corps and embarked

at Wellington on 14 December 1914.
