He was held in high regard by people who knew him, and was very popular among his fellows. From the first announcement that Now Zealand would send an Expeditionary Force to the war he was keen to go, but on account of being under age he did not succeed in getting away until the Fifth Reinforcements departed. Private Lee was a member of the Ashburton Old Boys' Football Club.
