SPOTLIGHT ON ECE



Matariki/Puaka has been a popular topic for our preschool tamariki and their kaiako this year. The retelling of a legend with props gives tamariki the opportunity to practise taking turns, listening and retelling a story, increasing their te reo Māori and learning about an important whetū (star).

Our contract with the Ministry of Education allows us to visit ECE centres; for centres to visit the South Canterbury Museum or for our educators to meet you and your tamariki at a local site.

We have 5 programmes that are available at this stage:

Matariki/Puaka Pūrakau (legends) Insects Rocks and Fossils Tropical Shells

Each programme comes with a pūrakau, hands on objects or costumes and a knowledgeable educator.

Allow 30 minutes for programmes at your centre with a recommendation of 20 or less tamariki in a group. If you are visiting the museum or a natural history site please discuss the programme length with one of our educators.

We really appreciate that the Museum can come into our kindergartens as costs of travel and logistics due to our full day where tamariki are arriving and leaving throughout the day plus the challenges in getting parent help when many of our whanau work are prohibitive in us going out into the community. We also appreciate Keely visiting as she is amazing with tamariki, keeping them engaged and highlighting their own knowledge.

PRIMARY SCHOOL EDUCATION

Basalt, limestone and greywacke -Geology has been a popular programme at the South Canterbury Museum and out in the field.

South Canterbury has some very interesting rocks and fossil sites including a volcano and limestone shelters which link to the rock art in our area.

SPOTLIGHT ON LOCAL COUNCIL

A new programme involving visiting the Timaru District Council Chambers has been taken up by two local high Schools. This programme gives students a chance to visit the chambers and learn about how local government works. Depending on the timing of the programme students can also meet the Mayor or a counselor.



Recent changes in our contract with the Ministry of Education have meant that we can now visit schools as part of our Enriching Local Curriculum (ELC) programmes. This has made a big difference for secondary schools who have struggled to fit field trips into their timetable. While nothing beats visiting historic sites we can now bring some of our projects into schools.

Science programmes including hands on stone tools (early local Māori); drama lessons involving role plays (Tiriti o Waitangi) and an interactive Matariki/Puaka lesson have all been popular this year and can be tailored to fit in the time frame you have available.
