DEATH AT STOCK SALE.

TIRAUMEA FARMER.

A tragic happening occurred at the Pongaroa stock sale on Monday, when Mr Bryce Wright, farmer, of Tiraumea. collapsed and passed away before a doctor arrived. Mr Wright was standing on the rails of a stock pen when he suddenly fell to the ground and passed away in a few minutes.

Mr Wright was a regular attendee at the sales. He was married, with four young children. He had resided in the district for some years and it is understood that he had been attended by a doctor for heart trouble.

The death occurred at Pongaroa on Monday of Mr Bryce Wright, a well known resident of Tiraumea, at the age of 50years. Deceased attended the sale at Pongaroa and he had just bid for a cow, which was knocked down to him, when he collapsed. Mr Wright came from the South Island. He saw considerable service in France; going with the 9th or 10th contingent and he sustained war disabilities, from which he has since suffered, including heart trouble, which was responsible for his death. About 16 years ago he took up a farm at Tiraumea, on which he has since resided. A widow and a family of one son (at present at the Waitaki High School) and three daughters are left to mourn their loss.

Farmer's Sudden Death

COLLAPSES IN PEN AT STOCK SALE.

Mr Bryce Wright, 50 years of age, a farmer of Tiraumea, collapsed at the stock sale at Pongaroa on Monday and died before the arrival of a doctor.

The late Mr Wright usually attended the weekly stock sale at Pongaroa and at the time of his death, was standing upon the rails of a pen, when he suddenly collapsed and fell to the ground. The unfortunate man was carried from the yard and expired a few minutes later in the arms of Mr Matthews.

The deceased, who was well-known throughout the district, where he had farmed for some years, was a married man with four young children. Dr. H. Paterson, of Pahiatua, had previously attended the deceased for heart trouble.
