Private Norman Stuart Young (Auckland Battalion), killed in action, was the third son of Mr Robert Hunter Young, of Hamilton East, who for many years occupied a position in the Lands Department. Private Young was well known in the Amuri and on Banks Peninsula, and was a long distance runner and representative footballer of some note. Of strong physique and intelligence, he was a fine type of youth and was one of the first to enlist in Hamilton. He was twenty-three years of age and his loss will be mourned by many friends who had learned' to admire his good qualities. Private Young is the nephew of Sir Edward Carlyle, who has for many years been Parliamentary law draughtsman for Victoria.

Private Norman Stewart Young (killed in action) was the third son of Mr Robert Hunter Young of the Public Works Department, late of Arnuri and Little River, now of Hamilton, and a nephew of Sir Edward and Lady Carlyle, Melbourne, and brother to Guide Young, who is also at the Dardanelles. He left with the Main Expeditionary Force with the Sixteenth Waikato Infantry. He took part against the Turks at the Canal, also at the landing at Gaba Tepe, and a fortnight later received four bullet wounds. He was in the hospital at Alexandria for 10 weeks, and returned to the front with one bullet unextracted. He was 25 years of age, a longdistance runner, and a representative footballer.
