Council decision paves way for new museum



After a process of public consultation and feedback in November, the Timaru District Council have voted in favour of proceeding with a full redevelopment of the Theatre Royal's back of house area and construction of an adjoining heritage facility. This will house the South Canterbury Museum's exhibitions, public programmes and education area. The two combined facilities will create a community hub for culture heritage and entertainment. The Museum Team (some of us at right) were jubilant!

This means that we can confidently plan for both current and future operations, with a target date of project completion in mid 2025. We will continue to operate business as usual from our present building through 2023 and much of 2024, before closing to relocate our public





facing functions to the new site. Our Perth Street site will later be repurposed as a heritage collection storage centre and public archives research facility.

This year will see us continue to contribute to further architectural design, along with developing an operational plan for the new facility, planning new exhibitions and carrying out associated fundraising (see next page). 2023 will be a very busy year, but an exciting one as plans begin to take shape and site work begins. Reimagining our heritage: exhibition design for Stafford Street

Over the last year, the Curatorial Team (Tony, Chris and Philip) have worked closely with exhibition design company Workshop E to envisage new long-term exhibitions that for the new facility. These will tell the stories of our landscape, life forms and stories of the people who have come to live here over the last 1,000 years.

We're taking the opportunity to take hundreds of specimens, artefacts and images from our rich collections, and use them to tell the stories of what makes our region unique. We will use both traditional displays and modern technology to create immersive world-class exhibits that will make this a must-see museum for all.

This project will be expensive. The Museum Development Trust is supporting it by looking to fundraise \$2.4 million to add to the Museum's existing budget of \$600,000. So far the total in hand amounts to \$1.1 million through generous grants and donations. The Trust will be holding a major public launch in 2023 - watch for more details.
















Exploring and celebrating our natural heritage at a local site

This exhibition highlights the Gorge's stunning landscape as well as a close-up look at the amazing range depth of biodiversity found in this special place.

Exploring the life of the colossal squid



In September and October we hosted the travelling exhibition *Colossal Squid: Freaky Features!*, toured by Te Papa. This intriguing exhibition included video footage, several squid parts in preserving fluid and touchable replica such as the enlarged rotating tentacle hook (at right). Visitors were equally fascinated and appalled!

The exhibition was set up by Pat Stodart and Jake Yocum (at left), Te Papa exhibition team members. It was great to source an exhibition small enough to fit into our temporary exhibition space; we're looking forward ot the opportunities that will come with a greatly enlarged exhibition space in our planned Stafford Street site.



Public programmes in full swing





Our public talk series has recommenced over the last few months. Recent speakers include author Mary Garden (above left, with local Gillian Owen), who spoke about her pioneer aviator father's life in New Zealand and elsewhere; Waitaki Geopark Communicator Sasha Moriss (above right) who gave an overview of the park's development, and Lincoln-based Dr Cor Vink, an authority on New Zealand spiders (at right).

Cor's talk was memorable for providing the audience an opportunity to see and photograph a live Australian red back spider, a species now established in Central Otago. It concluded with a post-talk night field trip to the Otipua Wetlands to view spiders and other creatures.

New arrivals in the Collections



Left: We were delighted to receive a fascinating piece of paleontological heritage from one of our youngest donors Blayz Richardson, (at left with his teacher and Museum Director Philip Howe). Blayz had discovered the partial fossilised test (shell) of a sea urchin from the Oligocene era while on a class trip to a limestone quarry in the inland Waimate area. The 25-30 million year old fossil was kept at Makikihi School until Blayz visited with his class recently and passed the fossil

Another recent acquisition is this chemist's cork sizer, (shown at right). Dating from around 1900 it was used at Timaru's United Friendly Societies Pharmacy. Wet corks were placed in the sizer, then the handle was rolled to squeeze the cork into whatever size was required for the medicine or pill bottle to be used.





Summertime fun: Sunsational Challenge and Retro Rock



On Saturday 18 February, we plan to hold the 5th *Retro Rock at the Museum* concert. This sees Perth Street closed to traffic and a truckstage in place with local bands performing live music to an appreciative crowd on the hill outside the Museum. Great music, dancing on the street and fun costumes make this a wonderful event for all ages. Previous *Retro Rock at the Museum* events have attracted crowds of up to a thousand. We just need it not to rain on the day!

Once again we're gearing up to provide a great range of activities for locals over the January period. We're one of several Timaru District Council facilities and sites taking part in the **2023 Sunsational Challenge**. This will see participants collect an activity card and visit the Museum, the Aigantighe Art Gallery, libraries and parks throughout the District to complete activities and have their cards stamped. Also taking part in the event are Geraldine and Temuka Museums. Participants qualify for small prizes as they take part, and can have the chance to win some major digital device prizes once they have completed the challenge.

This is the third year that this programme has been provided. It is very popular with caregivers looking for things to entertain their young charges through the long summer break, and discover new sites in their own district. Last year over 1,000 entry cards were uplifted, with several hundred completing all of the activities to enter the prize draw.
