THE FALLEN AND WOUNDED.

PERSONAL NOTES.

Mr T. Livingstone, of Durham street, ex-chief detective, has received word that his fourth son, Lieutenant A. R. Livingstone, is reported wounded and missing. Lieutenant Livingstone was educated first at the Normal School, then in Dunedin, and later at the West Christchurch and Christchurch Boys' High Schools. At the last-named institution he made fame for himself as an athlete, particularly as a footballer, and was a valued forward in the School's first fifteen. On leaving school he spent some little time in the employ of Messrs Massey, Harris Co., and later went farming in Hawke's Bay. He was a prominent member of the Old Boys' Football Club and Canterbury Rowing Club, and in 1914 was one of the latter club's champion maiden pair. Lieutenant Livingstone, who is 24 years of age, first enlisted with the mounted men of the 8th Reinforcements, and was subsequently drafted into the Non-commissioned Officers' Class. After going through every non-commissioned officer step, he received his commission as a second-lieutenant, and eventually left with that rank in the 12th Reinforcements. He arrived in Egypt just after the brush at Rumani, and was through every subsequent engagement. On July 19th last he was wounded by a bomb from a Tank, but soon rejoined his unit. Lieutenant Livingstone received his first lieutenancy on February 1st last, and was a leader in the C.Y.C., at times acting as second in command of the Canterbury Mounted Regiment, under Major Hurst, of Christchurch, by whom he was regarded as a very capable and efficient officer. Colonel Findlay, officer commanding the mounted men, also had a high opinion of Lieutenant Livingstone. Of Lieutenant Livingstone's brothers. Lieutenant R. H. Livingstone left New Zealand with the Main Body, and after being twice wounded was invalided back to New Zealand and discharged. He then went to England, obtained a commission in the 4th South Staffords, and was wounded again some time ago. He then joined the Royal Flying Corps, and is now in training outside Manchester. Another brother is now in camp, a third left with the Australian Forces, and still another, Captain H. Livingstone, is stationed in Christchurch as adjutant to the C. Y. C.
