Mr A. Hyndman, Cave, has been advised that his son Private Robert Hyndman, was admitted to hospital on June 8 wounded in the leg. Private Hyndman left with the 6th Reinforcements. He had enteric fever, was in hospital for months, and then went out to France, where he has been for the last eight months.
