Roundtree, and W. Kay with their partners. Dancing was continued until .11.45 p.m., when a halt was called for supper.

After supper a presentation was made. When Private Dass took his seat he was greeted with loud applause. The chairman explained to the audience the reason for the gathering and said that Private Dass had always lent a willing hand in anything for the good of Gapes Valley during the short time he had been in it, and he wished him God speed and a safe return. He then asked all present to sing the National Anthem which was played by the Gapes Valley orchestra, and was sung with great feeling. The chairman then called on Mr P. Mulvihill to make the presentation to Private Dass.
