
Mr. Menzies who was President of the New Zealand Federation of Master Plumbers in 1944 enjoys a long and distinguished record of service to the trade supported by a wide knowledge and practical experience of its many ramifications.

He was born in Scotland and came to New Zealand in 1909. He became apprenticed to the plumbing indus'ry in Christchurch and completed his term in Timaru to where he had moved with his parents in 1912. Mr. Menzies attended classes at the Christchurch and Timaru Technical Colleges in various subjects and enjoyed many successes, including London City and Guild's certificates in three grades and Plumbers Registration No. 1067.

At 21 he enlisted and served overseas with the 19th Reinforcements eventually moving to Germany with the Army of Occupation.

On returning to New Zealand he commenced business on his own account, being soon joined by his brother, and this partnership continued to their retirement in 1956.

Mr. Menzies has given freely of his time and energy in furthering the interests of the trade both locally and nationally; and besides being a foundation member of the South Canterbury Association, of which he was President continuously for 10 years he has served the trade in many capacities too numerous to mention. He still serves on his local apprenticeship Committee, and was recently elected first Life Member of his local Association.



Attending his first Conference in 1929 he was a prominent figure at many such events for several years, and will be remembered by many for his outstanding debating ability, a grand sense of humour and his willingness to assist many young Conference Delegates over their first hurdles.


Apart from his business activities Mr. Menzies was an active participant in a wide range of sports having represented South Canterbury at Bowls, Association football and Cricket on many occasions, he also played Club rugby for a few seasons and was interested in rowing. At Bowls over eight years he won five champion of champions' Certificates comprising wins in rinks, pairs and singles thus entitling him to the gold star of the local bowling centre. After a lapse of some years he now is anticipating taking up bowls again.



OBITUARY

Mr Duncan Menzies – Timaru

With the death of Duncan Menzies at Timaru earlier this month the Plumbing Industry has lost one of its distinguished elders who contributed much towards the progress and development of the "N.Z. Federation of Master Plumbers" and plumbing interests generally throughout New Zealand during the period 1920's to 1950's.

Duncan Menzies was born in Scotland where he received Primary School education prior to coming to New Zealand with his parents in 1909.

Settling in Christchurch, Duncan's first job was in a boot factory, but later he became apprentices to the Plumbing trade; this apprenticeship was completed in Timaru where his parents had moved in 1912.

Attending evening classes in various subjects at both the Christchurch and Timaru Technical Colleges, sometimes four and five nights weekly, he gained many successes including the London and City Guild's Certificates in three grades and his Plumbers Registration Certificate No. 1067.

Duncan served with the Army in World War I, he enlisted at twenty one years of age and went overseas with the 19th Reinforcements, eventually moving into Germany with the Army of Occupation in 1918-19.

He returned to New Zealand in 1919, and commenced business in Timaru on his own account. His brother joined him soon afterwards and this partnership remained unbroken until both retired in 1956.

Duncan has at all times taken a great interest in plumbing matters locally and nationally, and besides being a foundation Member of the South Canterbury Master Plumbers Association, he served as its President continuously for ten years, and has served the Pulmbing trade in many capacities too numerous to mention. He was elected a Life Member of his local Association in 1956.



In national Plumbing affairs Duncan Menzies took a keen and active interest and represented his South Canterbury Association at numerous National Conferences. He became President of the N.Z. Federation of Master Plumbers in 1944, and in 1957 was elected a Life Member of the "N.Z. Society of Master Plumbers".

The deepest sympathy of all who knew Duncan will go out to Mrs Menzies and family during their time of sorrow.

There are few persons in Timaru, and in South Canterbury for that matter, who can claim such a distinguished record in sport as Duncan Menzies, who has represented South Canterbury at cricket, soccer and bowls.

Looking back on his career, Mr Menzies says that in his opinion Joe Kane was South Canterbury's best all-round cricketer; Stewart its best rugby player and Tom Edwards its best bowler followed by Lyall Dewar (West End and Alan Hawkey (Kia Toa).

Joe Becket who died at Northampton last Friday, aged 71, suffered—and will probably continue to suffer even after his death —from the dismal memory of two one-round defeats by Georges Car-pentier of France.

The first at Holborn Stadium on December 4, 1919, occupied Car-pentier 73 seconds—and red rockets were fired to bring the grim tidings

to an incredulous London. Four years later Carpentier repeated the feat at Olympia on October 1, 1923, in a time variously estimated at between 15 and 35 seconds. It was quickly enough, anyway, to give berth to the now elderly chestnut about the patron who bent down to pick up his programme and missed the fight.

The second fight created great interest in Britain and on the Continent. Beckett gave it out that he would not be caught napping as he had been in the first fight. No sooner had the fight started than Beckett changed to a southpaw stance to confuse Carpentier. pentier also changed immediately and so perplexed Beckett that Carpentier was able to land his famous right to the jaw to end the bout.

Internationally, Beckett deserved better than to be remembered only for the Carpentier disasters. After all he was the heavyweight cham-pion of Great Britain and ended the "come-back" career of the the "come-back" career of the former world heavyweight champion, Tommy Burns, with a salutary knockout in the seventh round in 1920.
